

What Is OPEN TO ALL?

Open to All is the nationwide public engagement campaign to build awareness and understanding about the importance of protecting people from discrimination—and to defend the bedrock principle that when businesses open their doors to the public, they should be Open to All.

Open to All is a coalition of over 2,000 businesses including Gap Inc., Marriott International Inc., Levi Strauss & Co., Lyft and over 1,500 small businesses that believe in the basic principle that when a business opens its doors to the public, it should be open to everyone, on the same terms. The coalition consists of 200+ nonprofit organizations, including civil rights and racial justice organizations, lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) organizations and community centers, health and advocacy organizations, and faith organizations. What Is the OPEN TO ALL Elected Officials Pledge?

Elected officials who take the pledge and join Open to All are taking a stand for basic American values of fairness and equality in their city or state. The pledge is simple. Open to All Elected Officials pledge to:

- Take a stand for nondiscrimination in their city or state and work to create a welcoming and safe environment for all people regardless of race, ethnicity, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, religion or disability.
- Oppose discrimination against individuals or denial of goods or services based on any of these characteristics, and to work to ensure businesses provide all goods and services to everyone on the same terms.

What Is the LEAD Taskforce?



As a proud supporter of Open to All, New York City Comptroller Scott M. Stringer established Local Electeds Against

Discrimination (LEAD), a national network of elected leaders who support Open to All and are taking a stand for nondiscrimination protections in their cities and states. The LEAD taskforce brings together local elected officials from across the country to share model nondiscrimination policies, strategies for encouraging businesses to pledge to be Open to All, and ideas for bringing together local communities to oppose discrimination. Why Is It Important to Join?

Regardless of whether your city, county, or state has strong nondiscrimination laws or policies, it is still important to join. Why?

- If a business in your city, county, or state signs up, that
 means all of its various locations become Open to All, even
 those in areas without legal nondiscrimination protections.
 If a local branch of a national company wants to sign up, the
 whole company must sign up. So, encouraging businesses
 to be Open to All has far-reaching impact.
- Joining is an opportunity to be part of a national effort that counters the current divisiveness and fear and instead shows unity around the American value of nondiscrimination.
- As Open to All expands nationally, the public and other policymakers will see inclusive values reflected by leading businesses and favorite brands, not just buried in a corporate nondiscrimination policy, but as a visible value reflected on websites and brick and mortar buildings across America. This helps drive cultural change and reduces the anxiety of millions of Americans who never quite know where they'll be welcome.
